

## Work Up North

We once again find ourselves in a summer between pandemic "waves." There is light at the end of the tunnel: we have singing again in worship! Hymns and many parts of the liturgy have been reintroduced. Deb will be stepping back as "pinch-hit" organist and our regular musician will be at our (new) organ bench in September. Attendance is creeping back up, including close to 50 this last Sunday for a combined Baptism and funeral service.

You've never attended one of those? I've never led one. But we baptized the child of a new East Indian family, and did the English commendation for a long time member whose Wednesday funeral will be in Urdu at the extended family's wish. I centered my message on the role of Baptism throughout our lives. We may receive Baptism as a child, but its gift finds its real fulfillment at the moment of our deaths.

This was the second of two funerals in a 10-day period. We lost two older men to sudden heart attacks within days of each other. In neither case was the extended family Lutheran, and in one case few in the family were practicing Christians. In the case of the latter I proclaimed the Gospel in which a husband, father, uncle and grandfather had taken his stand, and had at least one man remark that they'd never heard a sermon quite like that before. We hope we might see some who attended again, but that is in the Lord's hands (see: Mission Moment!)

We have three community open houses and a FORO planned for the next three months. We pray that conditions will permit all of them to go ahead!

# Work Down South

The hurricane season has been quiet so far. The Caymans saw flooding and the passage of a tropical storm, but came through relatively unscathed. The movement of tectonic plates in the Caribbean has not been as quiet. I have participated in some of the planning for relief efforts in Haiti after the latest strong earthquake. Donations to support that work can be made through LCMS Disaster Response.

I will be in Puerto Rico next week to plan out what the next phase of our mission on the island will look like. With a new pastor and his family to be installed on Sunday (Rev. Adam Lehman), and the loss of our project manager (James Krey), there will be more changes afoot. But always foremost in our minds is keeping the main thing the main thing: telling people in as many ways as possible the Good News of Jesus.

## **Mission Moment**

Mission work is about nothing if it is not about patience. The patience to make a million mistakes while learning a new language. The patience of working through а new bureaucracy in а strange country. The patience of explaining things about Jesus that seem obvious to lifelong Christians but are bewildering to a Sikh, a Muslim or Hindu. And the patience of waiting on the work of the Holy Spirit.

There are conversations as a missionary that I started years ago that are only now bearing some fruit, like the man who writes a Facebook message and says that he has become convinced of the Lutheran teaching about Christianity. Such a thing happened this month. Or the son attending father's funeral who his engaged in а deep conversation about what our church believes, teaches and confesses.

One never knows how or when the Spirit will move. We can only wait on the Lord with, yes, patience.
