The one I'm thinking of right now goes like this: "Be careful of the words you say to keep them soft and sweet / You never know from day to day which ones you'll have to eat."

This idea is quite biblical, of course. Hear the Word of the Lord from 1 Peter 3:15 (ESV): "In your hearts honour Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect."

We are people of the Word. We love to share it and speak it – and hold others accountable for keeping it. Most of us are "prepared to make a defense." But too often we stumble on the "gentleness and respect" part.

Our world is desperately in need of the Gospel truth to help guide us through times of deep natural and moral evil. Lord, teach us to speak your Word with the same gentleness and respect with which You speak it to us, his children. Amen.




